Program FAQs

- Approved as a tutorial by the State Board of Education in October 2019
- Part of Howard Center's network of therapeutic special education schools
- The tutorial serves a maximum of 3 students for up to 6 months
- Provides crisis intervention for grades K-5
- INCLUSION integrates student academic programing with Trauma informed education and PBIS
- MTSS & instruction in content area as part of best practice pedagogy
- Effective development of individualized learning plans
- Teaching staff have worked to develop evidence-based, best practice instruction methods for high needs students, in concert with implementing any LEA required curricula

A Conversation with INCLUSION Education Director, Kristie Reed:

AOE: The first year, for any new independent program is difficult even under pre-COVID circumstances. How has the INCLUSION- TABS program staff and students adjusted to education in a pandemic environment?

Kristie Reed: "March 15, 2020 will forever be a date imprinted in the Big World of Education in our small state of Vermont. It was on this day that Governor Phil Scott announced, "a continuity of Education Plan for the orderly dismissal of all school, no later than Wednesday March 18, 2020.

Creativity and commitment in supporting our students were already are staple of our services at the Howard Center, finding ways outside the box to support our students and their families became the everyday new normal in the Tutorial and Behavioral services program (TABS).

Our TABS village pulled up their sleeves, collaborated remotely and created a small miracle: Finding every way possible to support our students social, emotional, behavioral, and academic needs.

We supported our students and families during a global pandemic by facilitating internet access and providing the technology needed for our students to access social, emotional and academic programming including supporting IEP goals; Facilitating food drop offs delivery to honor the free breakfast and lunch programs; Fostering therapeutic relationships and positive connections needed to maintain communication with our students every day."
