Item: VSBPE approved AOE ECE/ECSE Provisional License Policy (March 2021).

ITEM: Shall the VSBPE approve to increase the VSBPE approved AOE ECE/ECSE Provisional License Policy cohort of 25 by 15 additional AOE ECE/ECSE provisional licenses per year for 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.

AGENCY RECOMMENDED ACTION:

That the VSBPE increase the VSBPE approved AOE ECE/ECSE Provisional License Policy cohort of 25 by 15 additional AOE ECE/ECSE provisional licenses per year for 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.

BACKGROUND: The VSBPE approved the AOE ECE/ECSE Provisional License Policy March 2021. From the <u>AOE Universal Prekindergarten Website</u>

Vermont Agency of Education Offering Opportunity for Qualified Applicants to obtain Early Childhood Educator Provisional License

The Vermont Standards Board for Professional Educators (VSBPE) has approved an Agency of Education (AOE) Early Childhood Educator or Early Childhood Special Educator (ECE/ECSE) provisional license specifically for qualifying individuals who are employed or contract with private prekindergarten (PreK) education programs. Private PreK programs must either be pursuing or maintaining current prequalification status under Universal Prekindergarten Education Law (Act 166).

Superintendent Provisional License

It is the preference of the VSBPE that all applicants for ECE/ECSE provisional licenses work first with the local SU/SD superintendent to build relationships across settings and to support the youth in their shared community. However, circumstances may arise where a Superintendent is unable to endorse a request for a provisional license and an alternative route is necessary.

Superintendents, at their discretion, may approve a provisional license for a private prekindergarten program individual. If a superintendent wishes to submit a provisional application on behalf of a private program individual, the VSBPE Licensing Rules
Governing the Licensing of Educators criteria and procedures for temporary licenses

(Rules 5351-5356) are applicable. A superintendent denial for a provisional license is required evidence for applying for an AOE ECE/ECSE provisional license

Beginning June 1st, 2021, the Vermont Agency of Education - Early Education Team will accept ECE/ECSE provisional license applicant requests on a first come, first serve basis from candidates that work or contract with private prekindergarten programs. The first step is to review the AOE Early Childhood Educator Provisional

<u>License</u> qualifications to determine if you or another individual in your private PreK program may be a possible candidate. Second step is to complete the <u>Act 166 Universal Prekindergarten Changes to Prequalified Program Form</u>.

RATIONALE:

As it is across all sectors, finding qualified staff, especially licensed ECE/ECSE, is difficult when the applicant pool is shallow. The numbers listed below represent the need to increase the number of VSBPE approved AOE ECE/ECSE provisional licenses for private Universal Prekindergarten programs struggling to find a licensed ECE or ECSE.

As of 8/25/2021, AOE Early Education team has

- **0** -slots available out of the 25 cohort for 2021-2022 that was approved by the VSBPE.
- **9-** approved VSBPE approved AOE Early Childhood Educator Provisional Licenses for private programs.
- **16-** candidates under review for an AOE ECE/ECSE provisional license.
- **9-** loss of licensed ECE/ECSE programs who potentially will need a provisional license.

Mentor Support & Funding

Collaboration with Vermont Association for the Education of Young Children (VTAEYC) -Henderson grant approved

Collaboration with AHS-Child Development Division (Child Care Licensing) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) potential funding source for mentors.
