Alignment of High School Common Core Priority Performance Indicators and College and Career Readiness Standards for Adult Education for Mathematics

Purpose

This document shows the alignment between the high school Priority Performance Indicators (PPI) of the <u>Mathematics Proficiency-Based Graduation Hierarchy</u> and the <u>College and Career Readiness</u>
<u>Standards (CCRS) for Adult Education</u> for mathematics. This is based on Vermont's Education
Quality Standards and the <u>Common Core Standards</u>.

		Create equations and inequalities in one variable and use them to solve problems. Include equations arising from linear and quadratic functions, and simple rational and exponential functions.* (A.CED.1)
		Create equations in two or more variables to represent relationships between quantities; graph equations on coordinate axes with labels and scales.* (A.CED.2)
		Represent constraints by equations or inequalities, and by systems of equations and/or inequalities, and interpret solutions as viable or non- viable options in a modeling context. For example, represent inequalities describing nutritional and cost constraints on combinations of different foods.* (A.CED.3)
		Rearrange formulas to highlight a quantity of interest, using the same reasoning as in solving equations. For example, rearrange Ohm's law V = IR to highlight resistance R.* (A.CED.4)

		Understand that the graph of an equation in two variables is the set of all its solutions plotted in the coordinate plane, often forming a curve (which could be a line). (A.REI.10)
Functional Reasoning: Use linear and non-linear functions to interpret and analyze a variety of contexts.	Function Notation: Understand the concept of a function and use function notation. (HSF.IF.A)	Understand the concept of a function and use function notation.
		Understand that a function from one set (called the domain) to another set (called the range) assigns to each element of the domain exactly one element of the range. If f is a function and x is an element of its domain, then f(x) denotes the output of f corresponding to the input x. The graph of f is the graph of the equation y = f(x). (F.IF.1)
		Use function notation, evaluate functions for inputs in their domains, and interpret statements that use function notation in terms of a context. (F.IF.2)

		Graph functions expressed symbolically and show key features of the graph, by hand in simple cases and using technology for more complicated cases.* (F.IF.7)
		Use properties of exponents to interpret expressions for exponential functions. For example, identify percent rate of change in an exponential function and then classify it as representing exponential growth or decay. (F.IF.8b)
		Compare properties of two functions each represented in a different way (algebraically, graphically, numerically in tables, or by verbal descriptions). For example, given a linear function represented by a table of values and a linear function represented by an algebraic expression, determine which function has the greater rate of change. (F.IF.9)
