

Vermont Afterschool's Career Foundations program helps afterschool and summer programs engage Vermont's middle school youth through work-readiness and career exploration opportunities both within the classroom through activities and within the community through real-world application.

- Classroom activities consist of ten 45-60 minute lessons to help youth identify personal
  interests and strengths, consider the life they want to lead, reflect on ways to contribute to
  society, grow their financial literacy, and develop their soft skills (such as communication and
  collaboration).
- Youth engage with the community through field trips and guest speakers, which are specific to each site depending on the businesses, partners, and professionals in their area.

**Vermont Afterschool provides each participating site** with a full curriculum, 1:1 coaching, support in adapting the program to specific community opportunities, site visits, and evaluation tools.

## WHAT TO EXPECT

- Youth will have a better understanding of their interests and how to create careers from those interests.
- Youth will increase their financial literacy skills to have better understanding of real-world costs and how to live successfully.
- Youth will further develop their social emotional skills and 21st Century transferable (soft) skills.
- Youth will be better prepared to successfully enter the workforce.
- Employers will identify this program as a helpful step for youth to gain work-readiness skills.
- Sites will feel comfortable engaging with career exploration activities and the community and create opportunities for more youth.
