Regional Part C Interagency Agreement

Between the

Children's Integrated Services/Early Intervention

And the

Local Education Agency

Pursuant to:

Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 2004 VT Special Education Rules 2013 VT Part C Interagency Agreement 2014



In accordance with federal and state special education rules and the state Part C Interagency Agreement (IAA), this regional IAA will define the roles and responsibilities of the regional Children's Integrated Services/Early Intervention (CIS/EI) program, Local Education Agency (LEA), and other key partners to ensure that a comprehensive child find system and a smooth and effective transition for children with disabilities and their families who transition from CIS/EI services to Part B services at age three is coordinated and implemented within all regions of the state with the purpose of identifying, locating, and evaluating all infants and toddlers with disabilities birth to age three as early as possible.

Vermont's Part C Comprehensive Child Find System:

- Ensures that the system is coordinated with all other major efforts to locate and identify young children by other state agencies and programs including MCH Home Visiting Programs, EPSDT, health, Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EDHI), education, Early Head Start, child protection and child welfare programs including foster care and CAPTA, programs that provide services under the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act, and child care programs.
- Addresses the definition of eligibility (CFR §303.21) for appropriately identifying infants and toddlers with disabilities.
- Includes the public awareness activities (CFR §303.301), pre-referral screening procedures, central directory (CFR §303.117); referral procedures, timelines and participation by the primary referral sources (CFR §303.303), and post-referral procedures including screenings, evaluations, assessments and timelines.
- Targets primary referral sources including: hospitals, prenatal and postnatal care facilities,
 physicians, parents, child care programs and early learning programs, local education agencies and
 schools, public health facilities, social service agencies and other clinic and health care providers,
 public agencies and staff in the child welfare system, including child protective services and foster
 care, homeless family shelters and domestic violence shelters and agencies.



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GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Improving outcomes for infants and toddlers with developmental delays has been the shared responsibility of the Agency of Education and the Agency of Human Services, Children's Integrated Services/Early Intervention, the Local Education Agencies and other local service providers since 1991. The following principles guide the provision of early intervention services to infants, toddlers and their families.

- 1. The best way to meet the needs of individual children is to address the needs of the family.
- Family-centered services are both a goal and a process by which families are supported in being active partners in planning outcomes and services that they and/or their children need and want.
- 3. Family-centered practices and intervention is most beneficial when provided as early as possible and at the appropriate level of intensity to address need.
- 4. A family-centered process and services improve outcomes for children.
- 5. Individualized, well-thought out intervention services address the child's needs and strengths in the context of the family's concerns and priorities.
- Smooth and seamless transitions from CIS/EI to Early Childhood Special
 Education and other early childhood and family support services are essential for improving developmental outcomes.
- 7. Collaboration between agencies to ensure that families are informed of their rights, including the consent provisions of 34 CFR §303.420, the confidentiality and consent provisions of 34 CFR §303.401-417, and the opportunity to inspect and review records under 34 CFR §303.405-409 and that families and children receive available services for which they are eligible in a timely and coordinated manner improves program effectiveness.
- 8. Collaboration between agencies strengthens statewide implementation of CIS/EI services to improve outcomes for children and families.



This regional interagency agreement is intended to ensure the provision of a Part C Comprehensive Child Find System and to ensure a smooth and effective transition for children with disabilities and their families who transition from CIS/EI services to Part B services at age three. The role and responsibilities of the regional CIS/EI program and LEAs shall be detailed and maintained through this agreement. At a minimum, each regional IAA must be agreed upon and signed by CIS/EI director and LEA designee within the region and copied to the CIS/EI Part C Administrator and the Agency of Education Early Childhood Special Education Coordinator. The state administrator and coordinator will review the agreements and together provide technical assistance as requested or as needed to both regional CIS/EI Programs and LEAs.

Each regional IAA team shall develop, implement and maintain a regional IAA that is consistent with federal and state special education rules and the state Part C Interagency Agreement. Additional responsibilities of the regional team are to develop and periodically review the regional IAA; to accept and attempt to resolve complaints from children and families One Plan teams, whose composition is in state rule in more detail; and to meet at least annually, or as otherwise described in this regional IAA (section 8), in order to review and advise on issues related to Part C Child Find and transition activities in the region. The regional IAA team shall include designated representatives from the regional CIS/EI program and LEAs located within currently established CIS/EI regions.

This regional IAA must ensure and describe provisions for a comprehensive Child Find and transition system which includes the following:

- 1. Birth to 3 Child Count information
- 2. Public Awareness and Child Find *
 - a. Pre-referral Screening
 - b. Referral to CIS/EI (with screening results)
 - c. Referral to CIS/EI (without screening results)
- 3. Potentially Eligible
- 4. LEA/SEA Notification
- 5. Late Referral Procedures
- 6. Transition planning to Part B Early Childhood Special Education or other early childhood services

7. Record Transfer

And, the effective and sunset dates of this regional IAA.

- * Delineation of responsibilities for public awareness and child find activities including pre-referral screening to identify children and their families who may be in need of early intervention services.
 - a. Regional CIS/EI programs shall prepare, describe and disseminate resources, materials and information for families on the availability of early intervention services to all primary referral sources. Primary referral sources include but are not limited to hospitals, physicians, families, childcare providers, local education agencies, public health facilities, social service agencies, public agencies and staff in child welfare system including child protection agencies and foster care services/providers, homeless family shelters and domestic violence shelters and agencies.
 - b. LEAs shall act as a primary referral source to identify, locate, conduct pre-referral screening and refer children to CIS/EI who may be in need of early intervention services.
 - c. Develop and implement comprehensive referral procedures to ensure all children who may be eligible for early intervention services are referred by primary referral sources to regional CIS/EI as soon as possible, but in no case more than 7 days after the child has been identified as in need of a referral.
 - d. Develop and implement comprehensive developmental screening procedures to ensure all children under the age of three suspected of having a developmental delay or disability that may be in need of early intervention services undergo developmental screening.

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Part C Regional Interagency Agreement and Signature Page

This regional inter agency agreement in its present form or as modified shall be effective as of the date of signing and may remain in effect for up to three years. The agreement shall be reviewed annually by the regional CIS/EI Director and LEA designee and may be extended by the mutual written agreement of each agency. Prior to the expiration of the agreement the agencies shall meet to negotiate and execute a successor agreement. In the event a successor agreement is not in place when this agreement is due to expire, this agreement will remain in effect until a successor agreement is concluded. It is recommended that once the agreement is in place, the agencies use it to guide their interactions on behalf of the CIS/EI services system. CIS/EI and the LEA shall develop this plan consistent with federal and state VT Special Education Rules and the final Vermont Interagency Agreement 2014. The regional IAA shall be signed and copied to the CIS/EI Part C Administrator and the AOE EEE State Coordinator. The state administrator and coordinator will review the agreements and together provide technical assistance as requested or as needed to both regional CIS/EI Program Host Agencies and partner LEA.

The term refers to the efforts and activities of regional Part C CIS/EI, LEAs school district personnel and other entities as defined in rule to locate, identify and refer to CIS/EI or LEAs. Child find activities include a variety of public awareness activities, outreach strategies, developmental screening, and CIS/EI and LEA joint and separate agency activities.







Potentially Eligible, for the purposes of transition at age three, may be determined by the IFSP/One Plan team within six months of a child's third birthday. Evidence is based on on-going assessment measures and use of a State approved diagnostic instrument. A child shall be considered potentially eligible for Part B/EEE services if the child demonstrates at least a 25% delay in one or more of the five developmental domains.

Between six months and ninety days before the child's third birthday, the regional CIS/EI program will provide written notification (child's name, date of birth, and parent name, address, and telephone number) to the LEA where the child resides that the child on his/her third birthday will reach the age of eligibility for services under IDEA Part B and the IFSP/One Plan team has determined the child is 'potentially eligible' for Part B/EEE service

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
