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- Some of Vermont Ethnic Studies Standards competencies have greater connections to Vermont State Board of Education-adopted standards than others.
- Implementation relies on curricular and content decisions of curriculum leaders.
- Strong connections between Health, Art, Social Studies, and World Language SBE-adopted standards and Vermont Ethnic Studies Standards.
- Find more relevancy as considerations in curriculum design/approach.
- Reflects the views of content specialists at the Agency of Education and others may find connections that we have not.
