

## School Nutrition Programs Administrative Review Summary

Resource Management – Validation that SFA ensures the overall financial health of the school food service including non-profit food service account, paid lunch equity, revenue from non-program foods, and indirect costs. YES ⊠ NO□ Finding Detail: The SFA flagged in Revenue from Non-Program Foods and was not tracking actual costs for non-program foods. D. General Program Compliance 1. Civil Rights – Validation of SFA compliance with civil rights requirements as applicable to the Child Nutrition Programs. YES ⊠ NO□ Finding Detail: Documentation was not provided to show that all staff involved in the Child Nutrition Programs received Civil Rights training. The SFA did not have a Civil Rights Complaint Procedure. 2. SFA On-site Monitoring – Validation that each SFA with more than one school operating the NSLP performs required onsite reviews as specified by regulations. YES □ NO⊠ 3. Local School Wellness Policy and School Meal Environment – Documentation of compliance with the established Local School Wellness Policy. YES ⊠ NO Finding Detail: The SFA has not completed an assessment of the implementation of the Wellness Policy. **4.** Smart Snacks in School – Validation of the SFA compliance with regulations for all food and beverages to students outside of the reimbursable meal. YES □ NO⊠ 5. Professional Standards – Validation of the SFA compliance with required hiring standards and annual training requirements. YES ⊠ NO□ Finding Detail: Pre-K teachers responsible for meals in the classroom have not received training on program requirements. Additional documentation is needed to validate the information reported on the Professional Standards tracking tools.



Documentation needs to be submitted to show the Food Service Director met the hiring requirements, including a food safety certification within the last 5 years.

7.	Food Safety and Storage – Validation that schools meet food safety and storage requirements.  YES NO  Finding Detail: At Johnson Elementary School, the HACCP-based Standard Operating Procedures were not customized, the thermometer in the milk cooler and/or the milk cooler itself were not working properly, there was no thermometer in the minifridge storing milk in the pre-k classroom to track temperatures, tongs were not provided for ready-to-eat fruit, and the most recent Health Inspection report was not publicly posted.
8.	Buy American – Documentation that schools comply with Buy American provision and policy specified by regulation.  YES ☑ NO□  Finding Detail: At Johnson Elementary School, there were non-compliant products, without exception justification, observed on site.
9.	Reporting and Recordkeeping – Evidence that reports are submitted and maintained with other program records as required.  YES ☑ NO□  Finding Detail: At Johnson Elementary School, temperature logs and pre-k daily meal count sheets were not maintained on file.
