# **Review Findings**

3. Commendations:

All district and school staff have positive attitudes and the willingness to make changes which is much appreciated. The consolidation from a supervisory union to a school district offers a nice opportunity to introduce efficiencies into the program and move into full compliance.

Hiring a Food service coordinator, consolidating the Supervisory Union and, acquiring a new meal counting system that can be accessed from the Supervisory office are all positive changes that should increase the efficiency of the School Nutrition program, as well as, provide more consistency and quality in all of the schools.

#### **Finding Detail:**

Currently Pre-K meals are delivered directly to the classroom at Mettawee Community School. If the Pre-K meal service Point of Service is separate from the other grades in the school, these meals must meet the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) meal pattern requirements. In order to continue following the School Breakfast Program (SBP) requirements, the Pre-K students must come to the kitchen to get their meals.

Reimbursable meal signage and "And Justice for All" non-discrimination posters needed to be added to the breakfast carts.

Mettawee Community School and Currier Memorial School were both serving non-compliant grains for lunch.

Production Records were not thoroughly completed at Mettawee Community School or Currier Memorial School.

Mettawee Community School and Currier Memorial School did not include the ½ cup minimum fruit and/or vegetable requirement on cafeteria signage. The SunButter,and ham/turkey sandwich recipes at Mettawee were updated to include a 1 ounce cheese stick offered with each sandwich to ensure students had sufficient meat/meat alternate.

Students at Currier Memorial School that chose the bagel/yogurt/cheese stick meal could take two pats of butter, more than planned in the nutrient specifications.

The food service staff at Currier Memorial School have only received 1 hour of professional development thus far.

There were no tracking tools for Sunderland, Dorset, Flood Brook, or Mt. Tabor. The only training done at these schools is Civil Rights training completed by some staff.

Currier Memorial School is not tracking and documenting food temperatures. Kitchen staff, as well as teachers that assisted in the lunch meal service had gloves on, but no appropriate form of hair restraint. A standard operating procedure for meals sent to Mt. Tabor from Currier Memorial and a standard operating procedure for Mt. Tabor for meals received from Currier Memorial School must be created to ensure food safety is maintained.
