3. **Commendations**: Food service staff have a great rapport with students and school staff, there was a wide and colorful variety of fruits and veggies on the salad bar at lunch, and kitchen staff were following proper food safety standards.

A. Meal Access and Reimbursement

1. Certification and Benefit Issuance – Validation of the SFA certification of students' eligibility for free or reduced-price meals.

Finding Detail: Three students were incorrectly certified for reduced-price meals based on income.

2. Verification – Validation of the process used by the SFA to confirm selected students' eligibility for free and reduced-price meals.

Finding Detail: (1) The Income Verification process was not completed by November 15th, (2) the SFA verified more applications than required, (3) four applications selected for Verification were not error-prone, (4) two applications were incorrectly verified based on income documentation provided by the households selected, (5) families were not notified 10 calendar days' prior to decrease in benefit status as a result of verification, (6) and a confirmation review was not conducted on the applications selected for verification.

3. Meal Counting and Claiming – Validation of the SFA meal counting and claiming system that accurately counts, records, consolidates, and reports the number of reimbursable meals claimed by category.

Finding Detail: The reduced-price lunch meal counts exceeded the number of eligible students and the number of attendance adjusted eligible students multiple days during the review period at Bellows Free Academy – Fairfax.

Finding Detail: (1) The yogurt & grahams meal offered at breakfast on the day of review did not contain sufficient quantities and (2) the SFA is not following the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) meal pattern for the non-comingled Pre-K age/grade group.

Finding Detail: (1) The Nonprofit School Food Service Account has an excess fund balance that exceeds three months' average operating expenses, (2) The SFA has not submitted documentation for the comprehensive Resource Management review of Maintenance of the Nonprofit School Food Service Account and Revenue from Non-Program Foods, (3) and the Food Service Management Company (FSMC) provides free meals to non-program adults, not in accordance with the contract.
