Countering the Past of Least Resistance: Inquiry as a Tool for Teaching Hard History (April 6, 2022)

Champlain Valley Educator Development Center is providing this session where educators have the opportunity to join Dr. Kathy Swan to investigate one approach to teaching hard history using the Inquiry Design Model (IDM). You will have the opportunity to examine hard history with the core elements of inquiry—questions, tasks and sources—and look at ways that students can build a deeper understanding of a complex idea and a greater facility with the tools of inquiry over a course of study by regularly engaging in an inquiry. Next Gen Personal Finance (NGPF) (Virtual PD, Certification Courses or On-Demand)

NGPF provides several different ways for educators to gain financial literacy skills- and earn free 'swag'. Free On-Demand Modules, Virtual PD, and Certification Courses (specific in-depth content knowledge) provide the ability to gain financial literacy knowledge, find support for personal finance activities, and/or collaborate with other personal finance teachers.

National Geographic (Self-paced)

National Geographic is currently accepting applications for several different online courses of various lengths and time commitments. For example, you can participate in 90-minute course entitled "Applying Geographic Thinking Skills with Your Learners" or commit to 30 hours over 7 weeks Connecting the Geo-Inquiry Process to Your Teaching". Note that courses have various start dates; it is advised to register with NG to learn about new offerings.

Vermont Holocaust Memorial (March 22, 2022)

The <u>Vermont Holocaust Memorial</u> is offering *Analyzing Propaganda and Teaching Media Literacy: The Holocaust as a Case Study* on March 22, 2022 in Burlington. "This [educator] learning opportunity examines the events of the Holocaust through the lens of media, by examining propaganda deployed by the Nazis to discriminate against jews and other minorities. Educators will gain the tools to facilitate classroom discussions on the role and impact of Nazi propaganda during the Holocaust and support their students to critically analyze media in today's world". <u>Register</u> by February 28, 2022.

Flow of History (Fall 2022)

The <u>Flow of History</u> is a history education network for Vermont and New Hampshire communities along the Connecticut River Watershed. Flow of History offers professional development to teachers through study groups, book discussions, primary source workshops,

Model Diplomacy invites high school students to step into the roles of decision-makers on the U.S. National Security Council and UN Security Council to debate foreign policy scenarios. Through diverse case studies and interactive multimedia materials, the program allows young people to broaden their perspectives on the global issues that matter most. Visit Model Diplomacy.

Presidential Primary Resources Project (January thru April, 2022)

Internet 2 is excited to share the 2022 Presidential Primary Sources Project (PPSP) program series and encourages you to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity.

PPSP is a free, interactive distance learning program in collaboration with numerous National Park Sites and Presidential Libraries around the country. These sites present a series of free 45-minute interactive videoconferencing programs aimed at students in grades 4-12.

The 2022 program series will engage students in learning how to use and analyze primary sources as they are guided on a journey through the historical legacies of our presidents. A participating teacher explains, "You get to learn from an expert and virtually visit a location of historical value and interest in a truly immersive learning experience, where kids are not just being recipients of information but participating in the actual learning process by asking questions and analyzing artifacts."

The series begins January 18th and runs through the beginning of April. Free registration is now open on the website.

James Madison Graduate Fellowships (Application)

<u>The James Madison Memorial Fellowship Foundation</u> offers \$24,000 James Madison Graduate Fellowships to individuals desiring to become outstanding teachers of the American Constitution at the secondary school level. Fellowship applicants compete only against other applicants from the states of their legal residence. As funding permits, the Foundation plans to offer one fellowship per state per year. <u>Applications</u> are due March 1, 2020.



History Teacher of the Year (Nomination)

The <u>Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History</u> is seeking nominations for the <u>2022 National History Teacher of the Year</u>. Each GL recognizes first-rate K-12 teachers who find creative ways to bring history alive in their classrooms. Winners are selected from each state and US territory and become finalists for the national award. **State winners** receive a \$1,000 prize, an archive of classroom resources, and recognition at a ceremony in their state. **The national winner**, chosen from among the state winners, receives a \$10,000 prize presented at a ceremony in their honor.
