5 Books and Songs for Exploring Growing Patterns

From an early age, children notice and appreciate patterns in the world around them. Patterns and sequences of different kinds begin to pop up all over the place, especially in the books that children love. As the growing pattern is revealed through the story, children get excited because they can figure out "what comes next." What other patterns can you find on in your home? On a walk? So many patterns!

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VERMONT EARLY LEARNING STANDARDS (VELS)

Domain: Approaches to Learning

Element 1: Play and Exploration

Goal 1: Children engage in play to understand the world around them.

Developing Self Activities:

- Take a Sound Hike! Whether taking a sound hike at around your neighborhood, a nearby park, or even on a mountain trail, ask your child to notice the sounds they hear and make a list to talk about when you get home!
- Pillow Play: Place familiar objects inside of an empty pillowcase. Let your child try to guess what the objects are. Help the child describe how each object feels. Vary the activity by using holiday/seasonal items or items with a theme such as animals or shapes.
- Make a Salad: As you add different vegetables or other ingredients, ask your child what they see in the bowl. Pick out different ingredients and allow your child to take a bite of each one. Ask questions about the salad you made together: What do each of the ingredients taste like? Have you had that ingredient before? Do you like the way it tastes? Does it remind you of something else you've eaten?
