# VERMONT EARLY LEARNING STANDARDS (VELS)

Domain: Approaches to Learning

Element 2: Initiative

**Goal 1:** Children show curiosity about the world around them and take action to interact with it and learn.

## **Developing Self Activities:**

- As your child gets ready for kindergarten in the fall, start transferring small responsibilities over to your child. After a family trip to the pool, let your child be in charge of emptying the backpack, refilling the water bottles, or hanging up their wet swimsuit. Even when it may be easier for you to complete these tasks, let them accept the responsibility and be proud of contributing to their family "community"!
- Take a drive to the school where your child will be attending kindergarten using the route they will walk or ride in a bus or car. Talk about what they will see as the go to the school. How many traffic lights? Whose house do you see? Then the route back home. Familiarity is comforting for children even the trip to and from school!
- Kindergarten is different from other grades because there are a lot of firsts. It's a big unknown that can make kids feel anxious. Help your child get through the first-day jitters—and bigger worries—by talking. Ask things like, "What do you want to know about kindergarten?" Or, "You seem a little nervous. What are you thinking about?"

It might be hard for your child to understand or express these feelings. But asking questions and showing empathy lets your child know you're there.

• Take a virtual tour! School districts may offer virtual open houses and orientations. These tours can be of the classroom, modeling classroom routines (pick up/drop off, morning meeting, and lunch time) and even a walk around the school building meeting other members of the school community.
