

Introduction to Educator Quality Survey

Over the last 20 years schools have shifted dramatically to become more student-centered, standards driven, and accountable. Vermont students, too, are more diverse, engaged by technology and eager to become global citizens. Years of research have consistently identified classroom teachers as one of the most significant influencing factors for student success.

The Vermont Standards Board for Professional Educators (VSBPE) has the legal responsibility for the development of Vermont Educator and Administrator Licensing Rules and Requirements. The VSBPE is a 13 member board appointed by the Governor. The VSBPE is a teacher majority board. There are seven teacher representatives from across the state. Additional members include school administrators, Vermont college faculty, a school board representative and a public/community member.

The Vermont Legislators have requested that the VSBPE submit a report on or before December 1, 2018. The report will address if current educator licensing requirements are appropriate or need to be updated.

Throughout the survey there are questions related to a Vermont educator license and endorsements. A Vermont educator license holds at least one endorsement. An endorsement is the specific subject area and grade range that the educator can teach (Example Kindergarten-Grade 6 Physical Education). This survey includes questions regarding an educator license as well as the requirements for endorsements. Many educators have multiple endorsement areas.

This survey will take you roughly 15 minutes to complete and will provide the VSBPE and the AOE with valuable information regarding educator licensing in Vermont. We appreciate your time in completing this survey.

Licensing Requirements:

These questions are designed to provide information on the requirements for licensure as well as find out if the individuals completing the survey believe the requirements are "appropriate", or is it too easy or too hard to become an educator in Vermont. The bill language refers to if the requirements are "appropriate".

 - Student teaching experience: A minimum of thirteen consecutive weeks of supervised, concentrated field experience under the supervision of an experienced educator who holds a license in the same endorsement area; is normally coordinated and supervised by the college faculty in which the individual is enrolled.
 - Practicum: A minimum of 60 clock hours of supervised field experience which need not be consecutive.
 - Internship: A graduate experience where the individual is supervised by both an onsite supervisor and qualified faculty of a college.
 - Work hours: Based on endorsement, the individual is required to meet a specified number of hours worked in the subject area.
 - o 65 School Nurse: 6,000 hours of clinical nursing experience
 - o 65A Associate School Nurse: 800 hours of clinical nursing experience
 - o Career and Technical Education: 12,000 hours of field experience

Professional Standards for Educators:

The purpose of the following questions is to inform survey participants the process for establishing professional standards for educators (dispositions, skills, abilities, content knowledge).

- 46. A Vermont educator license holds at least one endorsement. An endorsement is the specific subject area and instructional range that the educator can teach (Examples Physical Education Kindergarten-Grade 6, Math Grade 7-12). Endorsements are on a five-year revision cycle to evaluate if the skills, abilities and content knowledge that is required of an educator in that subject area continue to be appropriate. When an endorsement is due for revision, the Agency engages in the following steps:
 - Researches current National Standards for any changes since the endorsement was last revised
 - Researches other state's licensing requirements for this endorsement
 - Convenes a panel of currently licensed educators who hold the endorsement that is under revision, and teacher faculty representatives from Vermont colleges with Educator Preparation Programs who teach that content.
 - The panel reviews the research gathered and makes recommendations to the VSBPE to either revise some or all of the endorsement requirements or continue with the current endorsement requirements.
